



Question: How could this this picture link Architecture to Politics?



- Sir Bernard Eder QC is International Judge at the Singapore International Commercial Court, and former High Court Judge of England and Wales.
- He argued that the architecture of some courtrooms compromise the right to a fair trial. The docks where the accused sit at trial can encourage a bias towards conviction with cages, chains, and accompanying police/prison guards.



Question: Should political education be a compulsory part of architecture courses?


- When India was fighting for its freedom from Britain, Gandhi was incorporating ideas of <u>sustainable</u> living and use of local materials.
- Self-sustaining architecture prevented dependence on trade with India's coloniser.
- The Gandhi Ashram in Ahmedabad is a functioning example of this ideology.
- This was adopted by various <u>architects</u> such as Charles Correa, Laurie Baker, and Hunnarshala, etc. The time in which this architecture was built coincided with a new identity for India.




Weighted average household electricity price* (per kWh, €)

Political analysis of the Energy Industry

- An energy strike could be a way for the public to take direct action against the profiteering of energy companies.
- This would involve coordinating to create a <u>surge</u> in energy demand by turning off, then on, all electrical home appliances at the same time.
- Even if the national grid could withstand this fluctuation, repeated strikes would cause <u>creep</u> in metal components of power plants.
- While these parts are replaced, the disruption would mean other sources of energy would have to <u>replace the current energy suppliers</u>.


